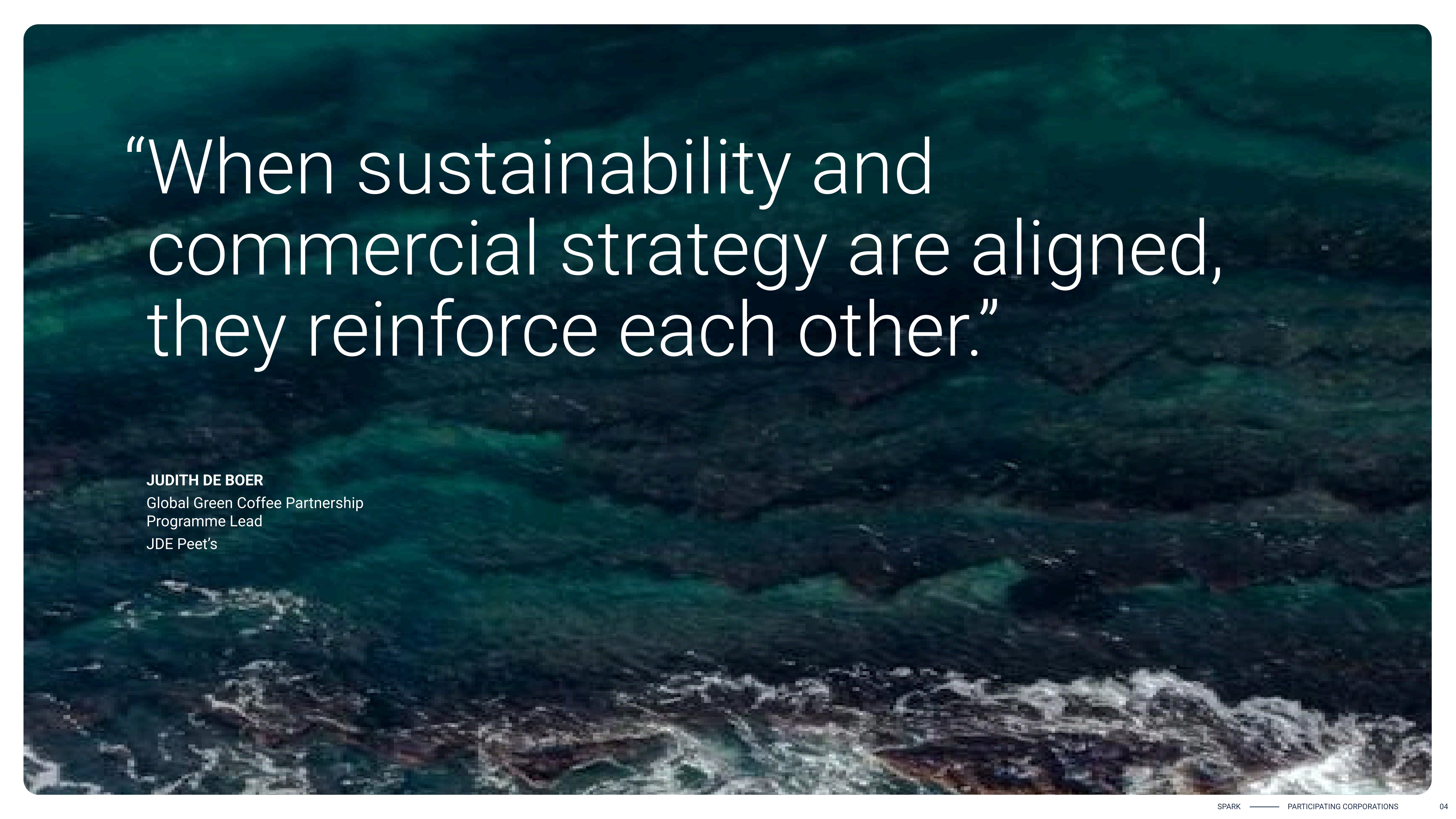

This playbook is designed to help you guide and support Supplier sustainability engagement in a way that is structured, consistent, and manageable.

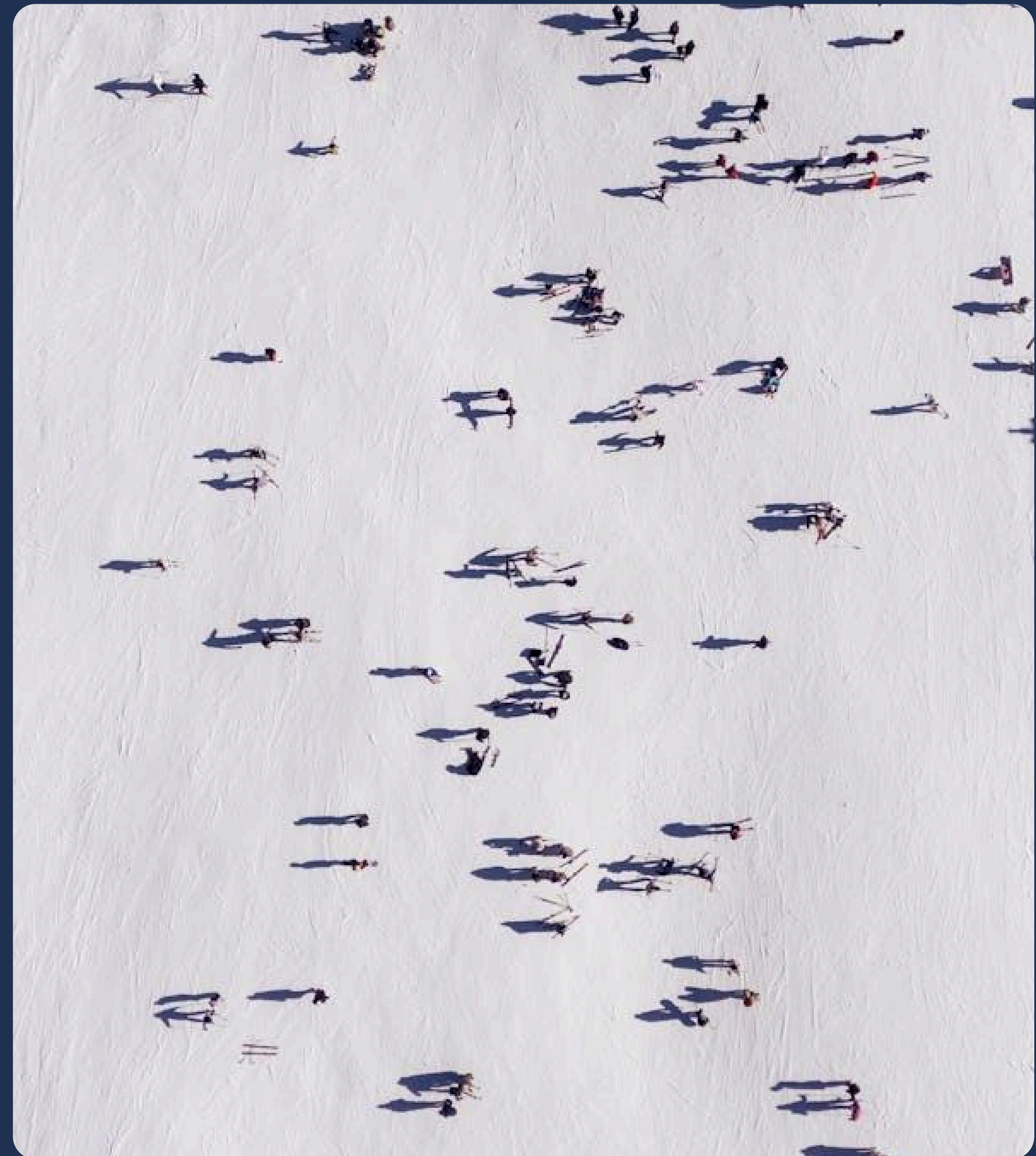
The SPARK programme equips Suppliers with practical tools to strengthen sustainability practices and meet the expectations of global buyers. By promoting SPARK within your Supplier network, you help local businesses become more competitive, while strengthening your supply chain.

As a large enterprise and UN Global Compact participant, you may already be on your sustainability journey. SPARK is a fast-track programme designed to help your Suppliers adopt more sustainable business practices like your own. We need your help recruiting your suppliers into the SPARK programme. This playbook is designed to make that process efficient and effective. It will provide an easy roadmap for you to follow so you can help your Suppliers stay motivated throughout the SPARK programme.

You don't need to build a new system to evaluate your value chain partners.

You need a clear framework.

SPARK gives you one.

The Role You Play in SPARK

Each Participating Corporation will invite and ensure their Suppliers participate and complete the programme.

Inviting and Engaging Your Suppliers

As a Participating Corporation, you play a critical role.

Your Suppliers are the key to your sustainability progress. By inviting them into the programme and ensuring they stay engaged, you extend your sustainability impact across your entire supply chain.

Your two core responsibilities are simple:

- 1 Invite your Suppliers
(Please be prepared to invite a minimum of 100)
- 2 Play a key role in making sure Suppliers stay engaged



Which Suppliers Should You Invite to SPARK?

Suppliers of any size are invited to join as long as they are in the beginning stages of developing their sustainability practices, and are part of Participating Corporations's supply chains.

This includes Suppliers that could:

- Better understand and manage key environmental and social risks
- Strengthen occupational health and safety practices
- Review and update their codes of conduct
- Develop a practical, targeted action plan addressing a clearly identified area of need
- Improve their capacity for sustainability reporting

You are encouraged to invite as many Suppliers as possible. At minimum, you can invite 100 Suppliers, but many invite up to 1000. The more you enroll, the more it benefits your organization. However, this can be adjusted based on context and there is no upper limit.

By engaging the right Suppliers, you can build more resilient, responsible, and future-ready supply chains.



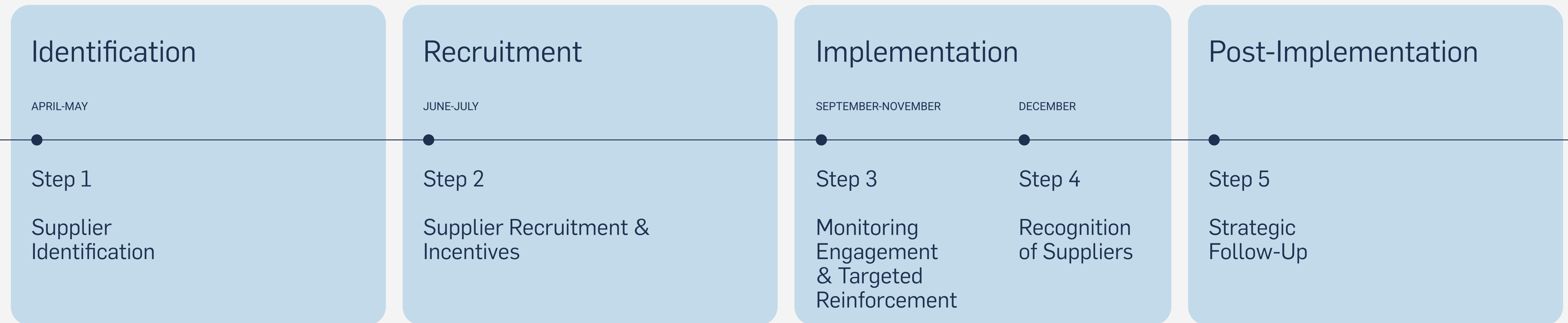

Programme Timeline & Activity

SPARK is designed to help your Suppliers strengthen sustainability practices. You will play a key role in their success by recruiting, onboarding, and guiding them through the process.

Your Activity Timeline

The following steps will guide you through the process of engaging your Suppliers in the SPARK programme. Use the included checklists to ensure smooth onboarding, strong participation, and clear reporting.



Step 1: Supplier Identification

During April and May, please identify and prioritize a group of 100+ Suppliers who are most relevant to your business and would benefit from the programme.

Completion Checklist

Attend the Orientation session with your Country Network

- In this session, your Country Network will walk you through the programme. You'll receive the materials needed to begin Supplier outreach, including the registration link. After the session, you can begin formal communications with Suppliers.

IMPORTANT NOTE: All communication templates are available on the [Participating Corporations Resource Page](#) (also linked in this playbook's "Communications Templates" page). This is your hub for Supplier communications and has been designed to make outreach simple and consistent.

Build your Supplier list

- Engage your Procurement team to focus on Suppliers that are strategic, high-impact, or operate in higher ESG-risk areas.

Finalize list and align internally

- Discuss the final list with your internal stakeholders to build consensus.

Prepare for outreach

- Confirm that you have updated contact information for representatives at each Supplier.

Before 31 May

- Send the *Supplier Pre-Announcement* email letting your Suppliers know that they will be receiving an official invitation to SPARK

Step 2: Supplier Recruitment and Incentives

Recruitment runs from 3 June - 31 July, with the possibility for an extension. You can ask your Country Network to monitor how many Suppliers are registered. At key moments, your Country Network will share email prompts for you to send to your Suppliers. And in August, remind your Suppliers that the programme starts in September!

Completion Checklist

3–10 June

- This marks the start of recruitment. You will be asked to send the *Supplier Invitation* email to invite Suppliers to register.

24 June

- Send the *Recruitment Reminder #1 (Early)* email as a first follow up with Suppliers that have not yet registered.

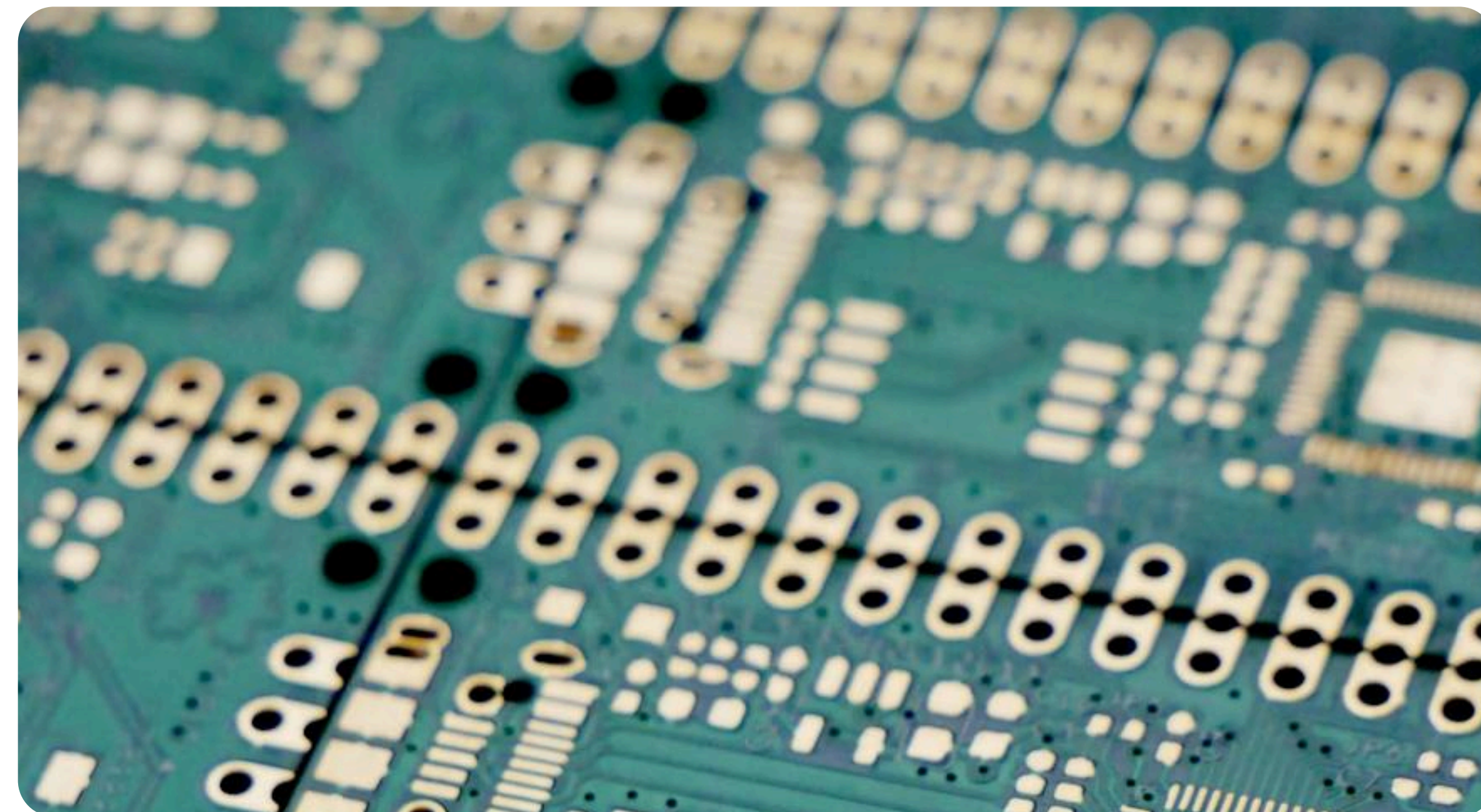
15 July

- Send the *Recruitment Reminder #2 (Mid)* email to remind Suppliers that spots are filling up and they need to register before the 31 July deadline. If you can offer incentives* for those that register, this is a great place to mention them.

30 July

- For any Suppliers who have asked for an extension, send the *Final Recruitment Push* email as a final reminder before the extended recruitment deadline.

*Here are some example incentives that you can use to attract Suppliers:

- **Supplier Recognition:** Provide confirmation a Supplier could be highlighted in a buyer's sustainability report and/or press release.
- **Enhanced Buyer Relationships:** Indicate the potential for better contract terms or preferential consideration in future sourcing decisions.
- **Capacity-Building Opportunities:** Explain how participation can open access to mentorship, grant opportunities, and more.

Step 3: Monitoring Engagement & Targeted Reinforcement

From 10 September to 10 December, the SPARK programme will be in session. Once the programme begins, your primary goal is to ensure your Suppliers stay involved and complete all the coursework.

Completion Checklist

As in the recruitment phase, your Country Network will email you when it's time to nudge your Suppliers.

8 September

- Just before the 10 September Welcome Session, send the *Programme Start Reinforcement* email.

24 September

- Send the *Early Engagement Nudge (Week Two)* email to ensure Suppliers complete their first modules.

15 October

- Send the *Mid-Programme Reinforcement (Week Six)* email as a midpoint check-in.

If one of your suppliers has shown limited engagement at this point, your UN Global Compact focal point will alert you and provide a *Low Engagement Escalation* email for your optional use to encourage continued engagement.

Step 4: Recognition of Suppliers

Once SPARK concludes on 10 December, it will be important to make Suppliers feel recognized and accomplished. Your Country Network will remind you of these the following steps to achieve meaningful recognition:

Completion Checklist

10 December

- After the Closing Session, send the *Completion Congratulations* email to signify this important accomplishment for your Suppliers.

December 15-20

- Within 1-2 weeks, you will receive a final report from your Country Network, including:
 - Full list of all Suppliers you invited
 - Which Suppliers registered
 - Which Suppliers completed the required trainings
 - Any other details on Suppliers' attendance

December 15-20

- When receiving the report, you will be asked to send the *Certificate + Incentive Delivery / Recognition Message*. This will reiterate programme benefits and any incentives you may have offered Suppliers during registration.

Step 5: Strategic Follow-Up

In the months after the programme finishes, Suppliers are ready to continue their sustainability journey and apply learnings from SPARK.

Completion Checklist

Early January 2027

- Send the *Post-Program Engagement* email to introduce next ways for Suppliers to enroll in other offerings from the UN Global Compact. If you promised an incentive for completing SPARK, deliver it now that Suppliers have finished the program.

Early February 2027

- Send the *Ongoing Supplier Engagement / Integration* email to check in on Suppliers' next steps after SPARK.

Programme Content

Over the course of the programme, Suppliers will explore key sustainability themes through a blend of self-paced and interactive content.

The following slides represent what Suppliers will see in their learning journey.

Types of Courses:



Online Courses

SPARK participants will have access to the UN Global Compact Academy platform where they will complete four online courses as part of the programme requirements. Participants must log in to access the courses. These self-paced courses are short and practical, designed for busy professionals. They help suppliers strengthen their sustainability practices, manage risks, and meet the growing expectations of global customers and partners.



Regional Live Sessions

In addition to the online courses, the UN Global Compact will host five live sessions throughout the programme designed for participants to learn through peer experiences and exploratory discussion. These include a programme introduction session for all participants, three regional live sessions, and a final closing call. The regional live sessions are tailored to each region's context. Scheduling for these sessions will vary by geographic region.

SUPPLIER CONTENT

Together, these formats provide a blended learning journey. The online courses build core knowledge and step-by-step approaches, while the paired live sessions deepen understanding through interaction, discussion, and real-world examples.

All courses and sessions must be completed to receive the SPARK Certificate of Completion Certificate from the UN Global Compact. If you cannot attend the live session, you can watch the recording in the Academy platform. You can still receive your certificate if you complete the courses and watch the session recordings.

Optional: Architecture of a Post

1. **State what you did**
 - “Engaged our Suppliers in SPARK”
 2. **Add one honest line about your starting point**
 - Show it’s a journey, not perfection
 3. **List 2–3 specific changes**
 - Real actions, not buzzwords
 4. **Explain why it matters to customers**
 - Reliability, transparency, lower risk, etc.
 5. **Acknowledge there’s more to do**
 - Avoid overclaiming
 6. **Keep it short and easy to scan**
 - Aim for ~100–150 words
 7. **Use simple formatting**
 - Short paragraphs + bullet points
 8. **Add 3–5 relevant hashtags**
 - Keep them grounded
- Optional: invite conversation**
- “Happy to share what we’ve learned”

FAQ

1. Registration & Logistics

1.1. Who can participate in SPARK?

SPARK is open to:

- Companies that are participants of the UN Global Compact
- Suppliers of UN Global Compact participant companies

Participation pathways may vary depending on engagement through Global Compact Country Networks and partner companies.

1.2. Who should participate on behalf of their registered company?

The programme supports companies beginning their sustainability journey and those seeking to scale existing efforts.

SPARK is best suited for:

- Senior leaders responsible for strategy
- Compliance officers
- Sustainability managers and ESG leads
- Leadership from operations, supply chain, or sourcing and procurement

1.3. Will a company be able to complete the programme after the 10 December end date?

No, companies are expected to complete the programme by 10 December. The implementation phase runs through December 2026. During this period, participants should complete the required courses and attend the live sessions included in the programme. Completing these elements within this timeline is necessary to receive the certificate of completion.

1.4. Can a company that took part in previous editions of SPARK participate again this year?

Yes, companies that participated in previous editions of SPARK are welcome to join again. However, as content builds progressively, it is recommended that a different representative from the company participate to broaden internal capacity and learning.

2. What to Expect

2.1. How much time should participants dedicate to SPARK?

SPARK takes approximately 10-11 hours to complete. Each of the four online courses requires approximately 1 hour to complete, and each of the four live sessions lasts 1-1.5 hrs.

On-demand courses can be completed at a participant's own pace. Participants are encouraged to progress through the programme sequentially to maximize impact.

Time commitment per session will vary depending on the depth of engagement and participation in live sessions.

2.2. Will participants receive a certificate?

Yes, participating companies that complete the SPARK programme will receive a certificate of completion from the UN Global Compact.

Certification demonstrates a company's commitment to embedding sustainability into its strategy and operations.

2.3. What if participants miss a live session?

Participants will be able to access recordings of the live session on the Academy platform and must watch them in order to get a certificate of completion.

FAQ

3. Accessibility

3.1. Is SPARK delivered globally?

Yes. SPARK combines global expertise with local implementation through the regional hubs and Global Compact Country Networks of the UN Global Compact. In 2025, SPARK included participation from over 155 countries across five regions: Africa; Asia and Oceania; Europe; Latin America and the Caribbean; and the Middle East. This global reach ensures that content is relevant to regional sustainability challenges and regulatory environments.

3.2. In which languages is SPARK available?

SPARK content is delivered in multiple languages including English, Spanish, French, Arabic, Portuguese, and additional languages depending on the course. Language availability may expand in future programme cycles.

4. Programme Impact

4.1. What impact has SPARK had to date?

SPARK is already supporting thousands of suppliers around the world to strengthen their sustainability practices.

In the 2025 programme cycle:

- 3,200 participants actively engaged in SPARK
- 1,416 suppliers joined as SPARK members
- 288 suppliers of large companies participated through buyer engagement
- More than 90 large companies expressed interest in enrolling their suppliers

After completing the programme:

- 90% increased their understanding of GHG emissions and sustainability reporting
- 96% said they planned to take concrete sustainability actions within three months
- 99% reported a stronger understanding of sustainability reporting frameworks

4.2. How does SPARK support supply chains?

SPARK helps strengthen supply chains by supporting suppliers and buyers with the knowledge, tools, and structure needed to improve their sustainability practices.

Through the programme, suppliers gain:

- Practical knowledge of key sustainability standards and expectations
- Tools to measure and reduce environmental impacts
- Guidance on implementing human rights due diligence
- Support to improve their sustainability reporting

SPARK makes it easier for businesses to respond to buyer expectations, improve transparency, and strengthen resilience across the value chain.

5. Data Privacy

5.1. What is the UN Global Compact Privacy Policy?
